

Judicial consideration, or noting up, of a statute or regulation involves searching for case law that interprets or applies the statute or regulation or a section thereof. The judicial decisions retrieved reveal how courts have interpreted and analyzed the legislation. Since statutes and section numbers can change over time, it is important to consider repealed or superseded legislation, with particular attention to changes to the section numbers.

electronic resources

[CanLII \(Canadian Legal Information Institute\)](#)

CanLII offers a [Noteup] feature for federal and provincial statutes. From the appropriate jurisdiction page, click the [Statutes and regulations] link to browse statutes alphabetically by letter. Click on the link for the appropriate statute to retrieve the statute page; then click the [Noteup] link. Click on the appropriate option to retrieve citations to the whole statute or a specific section of it. To retrieve citations to a specific section, enter the section number in the box provided. You will retrieve a hyperlinked list of decisions published in CanLII citing the statute or section of the statute. There is no editorial input into this list. It is not possible to note-up a particular subsection of a statute using CanLII.

Westlaw Canada *LawSource*

Using the Find/keycite a Document on the homepage, click on the Keycite option. Enter the title, section (if applicable) and jurisdiction of the legislation you wish to note up. Alternatively, enter the citation in the appropriate box. Click on the provision you wish to note up from the list provided. Citing cases are displayed by section and sub-section, and treatment symbols are included where applicable. Westlaw Canada *LawSource* contains federal and provincial legislation, including rules of practice for every court in Canada except Quebec. It also contains repealed statutes.

LexisNexis *Quicklaw*

Using the Find a Document feature on the homepage, enter the citation of the statute in the Note-up with QuickCite box. Alternatively, retrieve the statute or a section of it by using the [Find Legislation] feature on the home page or the Legislation search page. While viewing a specific section, click on the QuickCITE Statute Citator symbol or on the [Note up with QuickCITE] link located near the top left of the page. You will retrieve a list of cases that have considered that section, as well as the type of treatment given by each case (e.g. considered; referred to; cited).

To search for judicial consideration of a regulation, use a proximity search in case law databases by title and section number. This will retrieve decisions where the regulation title and section number are included. The text of the decision indicates any judicial consideration.

Maritime Law Book

A proximity search in case law databases by legislation title and section number retrieves decisions where the title and section number are included. The text of the decision indicates any judicial consideration.

Annotated statute publications

These publications compiled on specific statutes contain the text of the statute along with annotations. The annotations often provide in-depth information on the judicial consideration the statute has received. Examples include:

Canada statute citator. R.S.C. 1985 ed. Canada Law Book, 1989-

This is a multi-volume looseleaf updated service that selectively covers all federal statutes except the Criminal Code, the Divorce Act, the Income Tax Act and the Youth Criminal Justice Act which, due to their length and complexity, are covered in other publications. Each entry includes a brief digest of the case explaining the consideration of the statute.

Canadian Encyclopedic Digest (Ontario) 4th ed. and (Western) 4th ed., Carswell, 2009-

These multi-volume legal encyclopedias are comprised of two editions. The Ontario edition provides judicial consideration of current federal and Ontario statutes, including regulations or rules referred to in the titles. The Western edition provides judicial consideration of current federal statutes, regulations or rules and those of the four Western provinces referred to in the title. Every statute and every section of a statute that has been the subject of judicial consideration from Canadian courts and administrative tribunals is listed by subject title or area of law. Foreign laws that have received Canadian judicial consideration are also included.

Canadian statute citations. Carswell, 1994-

This multi-volume set with supplements, a component of the *Canadian Abridgment*, provides judicial consideration of federal, provincial and territorial statutes. Every statute and every section of a statute that has been the subject of judicial consideration from Canadian courts and administrative tribunals is listed. Statutes with the same title and different versions are listed chronologically. Judicial treatment of statutes (e.g. unconstitutional, considered, pursuant to, referred to) is indicated by symbols. International treaties and conventions and foreign statutes which have been the subject of Canadian judicial consideration are included.

Halsbury's laws of Canada. 1st ed. LexisNexis, 2006-

This multi-volume set which contains one or more subject titles provides judicial consideration of federal and provincial statutes, and statutory instruments in each volume, subject title or particular area of law.

Regulations judicially considered. Carswell, 2005-

This multi-volume set with supplements, a component of the *Canadian Abridgment*, provides coverage of federal, provincial and territorial regulations considered in Canadian courts and tribunals since 1997. It is organized first by jurisdiction and then by enacting statute. Consideration is listed for regulations generally and for specific sections. Foreign regulations that have received Canadian judicial consideration are included.

Rules judicially considered. Carswell, 1999-

This is also a multi-volume set with supplements that is a component of the *Canadian Abridgment*. It covers federal, provincial and territorial rules of practice and procedure considered in Canadian courts and tribunals since 1986. Judicial consideration is listed for rules generally and for specific sections. Foreign rules that have received Canadian judicial consideration are included.

It lists judicial consideration of statutes and regulations generally as well as judicial consideration for specific sections and subsections. A brief digest accompanies each case listed. There is also an R.S.A. 1980 volume.
