canadian cases judicially considered

Noting up a case involves researching its appeal history and the judicial consideration it has received in subsequent decisions. Judicial consideration refers to a decision being followed, distinguished, overruled or considered by a later decision. Searching for judicial consideration may help you determine if the case has been influential, locate similar cases, and see how the law has evolved in terms of a particular legal principle.

electronic resources

CanLII

To note up a retrieved decision, click on the [Search for decisions citing this decision] link. Alternatively, while viewing your search results list, click on the [cited by] link for an individual result (this link will be present as the last line of the result when there are citing cases in CanLII). You will retrieve a hyperlinked list of decisions published in CanLII wherein the case is cited. There is no editorial input into this list. CanLII's scope of coverage includes:

- Supreme Court of Canada decisions: partial coverage from 1876 and continuous coverage from 1967
- Court of Appeal of Alberta decisions: partial coverage from 1984 and continuous coverage from 1998
- Court of Queen's Bench of Alberta decisions: partial coverage from 1985 and continuous coverage from 1998
- Provincial Court of Alberta decisions: continuous coverage from 1998.

LawSource

Retrieve the decision you wish to note up by case name or citation using the [Find/KeyCite a Document] feature on the home page. History and citing references links will be displayed on the [Related Info] tab on the left side of the page. Click on [Citing References] to see the negative treatment, the positive and neutral treatment, and selected secondary sources that have cited the case. You can link to most citing cases.

LexisNexis *Quicklaw*

You can note up a retrieved case by clicking on the citator symbol or on the [Note up with QuickCITE] link at the top of the full text of the decision. You can also note up a case by name or citation using the [Note up with QuickCITE] search box located under [Find a Document] on the home page. Alternate citations, history of the case, a summary of judicial consideration and citing cases are given. You can link to citing cases.

The ANNOTATIONS section of the *Index, Annotations, Table of Cases* volumes includes judicial consideration of cases reported in the series, drawn from selected sources. The annotations are organised under series, volume and page number.

Carswell

A CASES CONSIDERED table is included in each bound volume and each *Consolidated Index* volume. The table sets out references to cases that have been considered in cases reported in that volume or in the volumes indexed.

Maritime Law Book

An INDEX TO CASES NOTICED, included in each bound volume and each *Digest and Consolidated Indexes* volume, lists cases that have been considered in the decisions reported in that volume or in the volumes indexed.
